health. Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull flew into Perth last night to announce the Origins project which will follow a cohort of 10,000 WA children for five years, from birth. The longitudinal study, by the Telethon Kids Institute and Joondalup Health Campus, will look at how a child's early environment influences the dramatically rising risk of a broad range of chronic health problems such as allergies, asthma, autism, diabetes and obesity.

The Federal Government's \$13 million contribution is in addition to the annual Commonwealth contribution to Telethon, which this year would be \$2 million.

In celebrating Telethon, we can't overlook the feel-good buzz it creates, from volunteering, participating or simply watching the 26-hour marathon of entertainment. Many people don't sleep until the final tally is announced.
